Entry requirements:

- A major **in Linguistics**, including 8 courses at 2000 and 3000 level
- "A weighed average mark of at least 70 per cent, calculated from the 36 units of courses with highest final marks, excluding 1000-level courses, from courses from the major", the weighting being by unit value (ie a 12 unit course counts for double a 6 unit course);
- written approval of an identified supervisor for the thesis

For some linguistics topics on particular languages, it may be acceptable to have instead of a major in Linguistics,

- a major in **International Communication** (useful for students studying Asian languages) **or**
- Four courses in Linguistics AND an Advanced Minor in French, German, Italian, Spanish, Arabic, and Persian.

What this means in practice for Linguistics students

Entry:

8 courses in Linguistics at 2000 and 3000 level [NOTE: LING1001 is a prerequisite for most of these courses, but it will not count as part of the 8 courses.]

Students who do more than one 1000-level course: LING1001 and LING1002 or ASIA1001 will have to do a further 8 courses: = 10 courses.

Students who do LING1001 only will only have to do 9 courses .

Students are strongly encouraged to undertake as part of their coursework LING2003 (Syntax), LING2008 (Semantics) and LING2010 (Phonetics), because most people will expect Honours graduates in linguistics to be familiar with these basic building-blocks of linguistics.

Joint Honours

The new program should make it easier to do joint Honours in Linguistics and Languages or Literature provided that two supervisors can be found from the respective programs.

It should still be possible to do joint honours with other programs, provided agreement can be reached on the research methods and other courses, as well as the two supervisors.
